Placed below is an analysis of cargo handled at India's 12 major ports during and up to March, 2019 along with Tables. Total cargo traffic handled by India's Major Ports during April-March, 2018-19, increased by 3.1% to 698.3 million tonnes from 677.3 million tonnes handled during April-March, 2017-18.

The overseas cargo handled at Major Ports increased by 0.7% from 520.5 Million tonnes in April-March, 2017-18 to 524.2 Million tonnes handled in April-March, 2018-19. However, the Coastal Cargo handled at Major port increased by 11.0% from 156.8 million tonnes in April-March, 2017-18 to 174.1 million tonnes handled in April-March, 2018-19.

The details of the cargo traffic at Major Ports during and upto March, 2019 is enclosed.

CARGO HANDLED AT MAJOR PORTS DURING AND UP TO MARCH, 2019

Total Cargo traffic at India's Major Ports

Maritime transport activity is driven by developments in world economy, viz, growth in world output and trade. Thus, volume of seaborne cargo traffic handled by ports is mainly shaped by the levels and changes in both the global and domestic activity. Cargo traffic at India's 12 major ports during April-March, 2018-19, increased by 3.1% to 698.3 million tonnes from 677.3 million tonnes handled during April-March, 2017-18.

The overseas cargo handled at Major Ports increased by **0.7%** from 520.5 million tonnes in April-March, 2017-18 to 524.2 Million tonnes in April-March, 2018-19. However, the Coastal Cargo handled at Major port increased by **11.0%** from 156.8 million tonnes in April-March, 2017-18 to 174.1 million tonnes in April-March, 2018-19.


Port-wise Cargo traffic handled during March, 2019

- Cargo handled at India's major ports during March, 2019 is 65.22 million tonnes showing a increase of 5.4% in the corresponding period of the previous year. The coastal cargo handled at Major Ports during March, 2019 increased by 7.4% from 15.81 million tonnes in March, 2018 to 16.99 million tonnes during March, 2019. The overseas cargo handled at Major Ports increased by 4.7 % to 48.24 million tonnes in March, 2019 as compared to 46.09 million tonnes during March, 2018.
- During March, 2019 Paradip Port posted the highest growth in traffic of 19.1% followed by Dendayal Port (18.7%), Cochin Port (13.9%), JNPT (6.9%), Haldia Dock Complex (6.6%), Vishakhapatnam Port (5.9%), Chennai Port (5.4%), New Mangalore Port (3.7%) and Mumbai Port (3.3%). The major ports which recorded negative growth in March, 2019 are Mormugao Port (52.4%), V.O. Chidambaranar Port (12.9%), Kamarajar Port (2.8%) and Kolkata Dock System (0.3%).
- Amongst the 12 major ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum cargo traffic at 11.32 million tonnes with a share of (17.4%) in the total cargo handled at Major Ports followed by Paradip Port (16.2%), JNPT (10.0%), Vishakhapatnam Port (9.4%), Mumbai Port (8.6%), Chennai Port (6.9%), Haldia Dock Complex (6.8%), New Mangalore Port (6.2%), Chidambaranar Port (4.7%), Kamarajar Port (4.7%), Cochin Port (4.5%), Kolkata Dock System (2.5%) and Mormugao Port (2.2%).
- At a broad commodity level, Sugar achieved highest growth of 46.5% in March, 2019 followed by FRM-Liquid (43.2%), Other Coal (36.3%), Fertilizer (25.9%), POL-Products (25.8%), Food Grain excluding pulses (25.4%), Edible Oil (24.1%), FRM-Dry (13.0%), Container (9.3%), POL-Crude (8.7%) and Thermal Coal (6.1%). Pulses recorded highest

- negative growth of 84.2% in March, 2019 followed by other ores (41.4%), Cement (31.8%), LPG/LNG (21.7%), Iron ore (11.3%), Iron & Steel (9.9%), other commodities (8.8%) and Coking Coal (8.5%).
- At a broad commodity level, POL crude handled the maximum cargo traffic of 14.01 Million tonnes in March, 2019 with a share of 21.5% followed by container (20.6%), thermal Coal (13.6%), other commodities (9.9%), POL products (9.4%), , iron ore (7.1%), Coking coal (4.3%), Other coal (4.1%), Edible Oil (1.8%), LPG or LNG (1.5%), Iron & Steel (1.4%), Fertilizer (1.1%), FRM-Dry (1.1%), FRM-Liquid (1.0%) and Other Ores (0.6%).

Cargo traffic handled during April-March, 2018-19

- During April-March, 2018-19, Kamarjar Port recorded highest growth in traffic at 13.8% followed by Haldia Dock Complex (11.6%), Cochin Port (9.9%), JNPT (7.2%), Paradip Port (7.1%), Deendayal Port (6.1%), Kolkata Dock System (4.8%), Vishakhapatnam (2.9%), Chennai Port (2.2%) and New Mangalore port (1.1%). Major ports that recorded negative growth in traffic during April-March, 2018-19 were: Mormugao Port (34.2%) followed by V.O. Chidambaranar Port (6.1%) and Mumbai Port (3.5%) over April-March, 2017-18 (Table A).
- Amongst the Major Ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum Cargo of 115.4 million tonnes with a share of 16.5% followed by Paradip Port (15.6%), JNPT (10.1%), Vishakhapatnam Port (9.4%), Mumbai Port (8.7%), Chennai Port (7.6%), Haldia Dock Complex (6.5%), New Mangalore Port (6.1%), Kamarajar Port (4.9%), Chidambaranar Port (4.9%), Cochin Port (4.6%), Kolkata Dock System (2.6%) and Mormugao Port (2.5%) during April-March, 2018-19 (Graph I below).


- At a broad commodity level, Project cargo recorded the highest growth in traffic at 146.6% followed by thermal coal (14.3%), other coal (10.4%), coking coal (10.1%), Fertilizer (9.4%), Container cargo (9.1%), POL Products (5.5%), FRM-Liquid (3.2%) POL crude (1.4%) and LPG/LNG (1.2%) during April-March, 2018-19. Pulses recorded highest negative growth 77.4% in traffic during April-March, 2018-19 followed by Food grains excluding pulses (60.8%), other ore (30.4%), Cement (14.6%), Iron & Steel (8.1%), FRM-Dry (8.0%), Iron Ore (7.7%) Other Commodities (7.1%), Sugar (3.4%) and Edible Oil (0.6%) over April-March, 2017-18 (**Table B**).
- Amongst all the commodities, POL crude handled the maximum cargo of 156.5 million tonnes with a share of 22.4% followed by Container (20.8%), thermal coal (13.9%), others commodities (10.0%), POL Products (9.1%), iron ore (5.4%), Coking coal (5.3%), other coal (3.6%), edible oil (1.7%), LPG/LNG (1.6%), Iron & Steel (1.4%), fertilizer (1.2%), FRM Dry (1.0%), FRM liquid (0.8%) and Cement (0.6%) during April-March, 2018-19.

Overseas and Coastal Cargo traffic handled during April-March, 2018-19

• Amongst the Major Ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum Overseas Cargo of 102.67 million tonnes with a share of 19.6% followed by Paradip Port (13.6%), JNPT (12.6%), Chennai Port (9.2%), Vishakhapatnam Port (9.2%), New Mangalore Port (6.6%), Mumbai Port (6.5%), Haldia Dock Complex (5.5%), Chidambaranar Port (4.6%), Cochin Port (4.0%), Kamarajar Port (2.9%), Kolkata Dock System (2.9%) and Mormugao Port (2.8%), during April-March, 2018-19 (Graph II).



• Amongst the Major Ports, Paradip Port handled the maximum Coastal Cargo of 38.2 million tonnes with a share of 21.9% followed by Mumbai Port (15.3%), Kamarajar Port (11.0%), Vishakhapatnam Port (9.8%), Haldia Dock Complex (9.4%), Deendayal Port (7.3%), Cochin Port (6.3%), Chidambaranar Port (5.9%), New Mangalore Port (4.4%), Chennai Port (2.8%) JNPT (2.8%), Mormugao Port (1.6%) and Kolkata Dock System (1.5%) during April-March, 2018-19 (Graph III).
