CARGO HANDLED AT STATE MARITIME/ STATE DIRECTORATE (Non-Major Ports) DURING AND UP TO SEPTEMBER, 2019

Total Cargo traffic at India's State Maritime/ State Directorate

Maritime transport activity is driven by developments in world economy, viz, growth in world output and trade. Thus, volume of seaborne cargo traffic handled by ports is mainly shaped by the levels and changes in both the global and domestic activity. Cargo traffic at Non-Major Ports during April-September, 2019-20, increased by 5.4% to 293.69 million tonnes from 278.56 million tonnes handled during April-September, 2018-19.

The overseas cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during April-September, 2019-20 increased by 6.7% to 250.25 million tonnes from 234.46 million tonnes during April-September, 2018-19. However, the coastal cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during April-September, 2019-20 decreased by 1.5% to 43.45 million tonnes from 44.10 million tonnes handled during April-September, 2018-19.

Port-wise Cargo traffic handled during September, 2019


- Cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during September, 2019 is 46.25 million tonnes showing an increase of 0.9% in the corresponding period of the previous year. However, the coastal cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during September, 2019 decreased by 13.7% to 6.28 million tonnes from 7.27 million tonnes during September, 2018. The overseas cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during September, 2019 increased by 3.6% to 39.97 million tonnes from 38.58 million tonnes during September, 2018.
- During September, 2019, the Non-Major Ports of Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (54.6%) recorded highest growth in traffic, followed by the Non-Major Ports of Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (48.2%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (41.3%), Ports Management Board, A&N (27.2%), and Gujarat Maritime Board (GMB) (2.4%). The State Maritime/ State Directorate which recorded negative growth in September, 2019 are, Directorate of Ports, Kerala (40.7%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (35.0%), and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (34.3%).
- Amongst the State Maritime/ State Directorate, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum cargo traffic at 32.00 million tonnes with a share of (69.2%) in the total cargo handled at State Maritime/State Directorate followed by Directorate of Ports, Andhra Pradesh (18.6%), Odisha and Maharashtra Maritime Board (5.2%) each, Puducherry (1.3%), A&N Islands (0.3%) and Karnataka and TNMB (0.1%) each.
- At a broad commodity level, Other Ores achieved highest growth of 82.6% in September, 2019 followed by Fertilizer (46.4%), Coking Coal (20.9%), Container (13.2%), LPG or LNG (9.8%),

Cement (8.8%), Building Material (7.2%), POL Products (6.2%), FRM Liquid (0.7%) and Thermal Coal (0.5%). Iron Ore Pellets/ Fine recorded highest negative growth of 18.8% in September, 2019 followed by POL Crude (17.0%), Iron & Steel (7.4%), Other Coal (5.5%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (5.2%), Edible Oil (5.1%) and other Ores (0.5%).

At a broad commodity level, Container handled the maximum cargo traffic of **7.56 Million tonnes** with share of 16.4% in September 2019 followed by POL Crude (13.4%), thermal coal (13.3%), POL Products (12.9%), Other Coal (9.6%), other commodities (9.0%), Iron ore Pellets/ Fine (6.4%), Coking coal (6.1%), LPG & LNG (4.5%), Fertilizer (3.6%), Cement (1.5%), Iron & Steel (1.1%), Edible Oil and Other Ores (0.6%) each and building material (0.4%).

Cargo traffic handled during April-September, 2019

During the April-September, 2019-20, Directorate of Ports Odisha recorded highest growth in traffic at 58.5% followed by Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (43.4%), Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (38.2%), Directorate of Ports, A&N (34.7%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (24.6%), Directorate of Ports, Kerala (22.1%) and Gujarat Maritime Board (4.2%). State Maritime/ State Directorate that recorded negative growth in traffic during April-September, 2019-20 was: Captain of Ports, Goa (45.3%) and Maharashtra Maritime Board (3.2%) by over April-September, 2018-19 (Table-1).



Amongst the State Maritime/ State Directorate, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum Cargo of 200.18 million tonnes with a share of 68.2% followed by Directorate of Ports, Andhra Pradesh (17.6%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (6.6%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (5.2%), Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (1.8%), A&N Islands (0.3%) and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka and Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (0.2%) each during April-September, 2019-20 (Graph 1 above).

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- During the April-September, 2019-20, Coking Coal recorded highest growth in traffic at 23.8% followed by Iron & Steel (17.8%), Building Material (17.7%), Thermal Coal (12.9%), Other Coal (12.0%), LPG/LNG (8.6%), Container (6.6%), Cement (5.6%), Edible Oil (5.2%), POL Products (5.1%) and Fertilizer (1.8%). Other Ores recorded highest negative growth 12.2% in traffic during April-September, 2019-20 followed by POL Crude (4.7%), Iron Ore Pellets/ Fine (2.1%), FRM Liquid (0.9%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (0.7%) and Other Commodities (0.1%) over April-September, 2018-19 (Table 2).
- Amongst the all commodities, POL crude is the highest commodity handled at ports of 46.47 million tonnes with a share of 15.8% followed by Container (15.2%), Thermal Coal (12.4%), POL Products (11.6%), Other Coal (10.9%), Other commodities (9.6%), Iron Ore/ Pellets (7.0%), Coking Coal (5.9%), LPG & LNG (4.2%), fertilizer (2.4%), Cement (1.8%), Iron & Steel (1.2%), Edible Oil (0.6%), Building Material (0.5%) and other ores (0.3%) during April-September, 2019-20.



Overseas and Coastal Cargo traffic handled during April-September, 2019

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• Amongst the Non-Major Ports, Gujarat Maritime Board (GMB) handled the maximum Overseas Cargo of 176.90 million tonnes with a share of 70.7% followed by Directorate of Ports, Andhra Pradesh (17.6%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (5.5%), MMB (3.8%), Puducherry (2.1%) and TNMB (0.2%) and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (0.1%) each during April-September, 2019-20 (Graph 2).



Amongst the Non-Major Ports, GMB handled the maximum Coastal Cargo of 23.28 million tonnes with a share of 53.6% followed by MMB (22.7%), Directorate of Ports, Andhra Pradesh (17.5%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (3.7%), A&N Islands (2.0%), Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (0.3%), Kerala and TNMB (0.1%) each during April-September, 2019-20 (Graph 3).
