CARGO HANDLED AT STATE MARITIME/ STATE DIRECTORATE (Non-Major Ports) DURING AND UP TO JUNE, 2023

Total Cargo traffic at India's State Maritime/ State Directorate

Maritime transport activity is driven by developments in world economy, viz, growth in world output and trade. Thus, volume of seaborne cargo traffic handled by ports is mainly shaped by the levels and changes in both the global and domestic activity. Cargo traffic at Non-Major Ports during **April-June**, **2023-24**, **increased by 3.8% to 176.11 million tonnes** from 169.62 million tonnes handled during April-June, 2022-23.

The overseas cargo traffic handled at Non-Major Ports during April-June, 2023-24 increased by 0.9% to 141.19 million tonnes from 139.95 million tonnes during April-June, 2022-23. The coastal cargo traffic handled at Non-Major Ports during April-June, 2023-24 increased by 17.7% to 34.92 million tonnes from 29.67 million tonnes handled during April-June, 2022-23.


Port-wise Cargo traffic handled during June, 2023

- Cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during June, 2023 is 54.02 million tonnes showing an decrease in growth of 4.4% as compared to 56.52 million tonnes of cargo handled in the corresponding period of the previous year. The coastal cargo traffic handled at Non-Major Ports during June, 2023 increased by 14.8% to 10.20 million tonnes from 8.89 million tonnes during June, 2022. The overseas cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during June, 2023 decreased by 8.0% to 43.82 million tonnes from 47.63 million tonnes during June, 2022.
- During June, 2023, the Non-Major Ports of Ports Management Board, A&N recorded highest growth in traffic of 52.4% as compared to the corresponding period of the previous year although there is negligible share in total Cargo handled, followed by the Non-Major Ports of Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (19.7%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (MMB) (8.7%) and Directorate of Ports, Odisha (3.4%). The State Maritime/ State Directorate which recorded negative growth in June, 2023 are Kerala Maritime Board (KMB) (50.7%) followed by Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (28.3%), Gujarat Maritime Board (GMB) (13.0%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (TNMB) (8.9%) and Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (2.5%).
- During June, 2023, amongst the State Maritime/ State Directorate, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum cargo traffic at 31.95 million tonnes with a share of (59.2%) in the total cargo handled at State Maritime/State Directorate followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (20.6%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (9.9%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (6.5%), Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (1.9%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (1.5%), Ports Management Board, A&N Islands (0.4%) and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (0.2%).

- At a broad commodity level, Other Ores record highest growth of 123.1% in June, 2023 as compared to the corresponding period of the previous year followed by Edible Oil (80.4%), Iron Ore (59.8%), Fertilizer (58.4%), Building Material (24.1%), Coking Coal (8.0%) and Other Commodities (7.6%). Project Cargo recorded highest negative growth of 66.6% in June, 2023 followed by Iron and Steel (57.0%), Cement (42.8%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (30.2%), Thermal Coal (25.7%), POL Crude (24.6%), Sugar (22.2%), FRM Liquid (19.8%), POL Products (15.4%), Containers (2.9%), Other Coal (2.3%) and LPG or LNG (1.1%).
- At a broad commodity level, **Other Coal** shows the maximum cargo traffic of **9.59 Million tonnes** with share of **17.8%** in June 2023 followed by Containers (17.5%), POL Crude (12.1%), Other Commodities (11.3%), POL Products (9.5%), Iron ore Pellets/ Fine (9.0%), Thermal Coal (6.6%), Coking Coal (6.6%), LPG or LNG (3.2%), Fertilizer (2.1%), Cement (1.2%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (0.8%), Edible Oil (0.6%), Other Ores (0.4%), Iron & Steel (0.4%), Sugar (0.3%), FRM Dry (0.3%), FRM Liquid (0.2%) and Building Material (0.2%).

Cargo traffic handled during April-June, 2023-24

• During the April-June, 2023-24, **Captain of Ports, Goa** recorded highest growth in traffic at 233.9% although there is negligible share in total Cargo handled followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (20.5%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (18.2%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (11.7%) and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (7.9%). State Maritime/ State Directorate that recorded negative growth in traffic during April-June, 2023-24 was Kerala Maritime Board (19.4%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (7.1%), Directorate of Ports, Pudducherry (3.0%), Gujarat Maritime Board (2.5%) and Ports Management Board, A&N Islands (2.0%) over April-June, 2022-23 (**Table-1**).

• Amongst the State Maritime/ State Directorate, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum Cargo of 105.82 million tonnes with a share of 60.1% followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime

Board (17.9%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (11.3%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (7.3%), Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (1.5%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (1.4%) and Others (0.5%) which includes cargo handled by Non-Major Ports of A&N Island, GOA, Kerala and Karnataka during April-June, 2023-24 (**Graph 1 above**).

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- During the April-June, 2023-24, **Other Ores** record highest growth of 77.3% followed by Building Material (77.2%), Edible Oil (35.7%), Iron Ore (31.9%), FRM Liquid (24.8%), Other Coal (12.0%), Fertilizer (11.1%), Thermal Coal (7.0%), Containers (6.0%), Other Commodities (0.5%) and LPG or LNG (0.1%). **Project Cargo** recorded highest negative growth of 67.0% in traffic during April-June, 2023-24 followed by Sugar (66.4%), Pulses (57.7%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (32.3%), Iron and Steel (29.8%), Cement (25.6%), POL Crude (8.1%), POL Products (3.0%) and Coking Coal (0.4%) over April-June, 2022-23 (**Table 2**).
- Amongst all commodities, **Other Coal** is the highest commodity handled at ports of 31.76 million tonnes with a share of 18.0% followed by Containers (17.4%), POL Crude (12.7%), Other Commodities (10.3%), Iron Ore (10.3%), POL Products (9.8%), Thermal Coal (6.5%), Coking Coal (6.0%), LPG & LNG (3.1%), Fertilizer (1.6%), Cement (1.4%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (0.6%), Iron & Steel (0.5%), Edible Oil (0.5%), Other Ores (0.3%), Building Material (0.3%), FRM Liquid and Sugar (0.2%) and FRM Dry (0.1%) each during April-June, 2023-24.



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
Overseas and Coastal Cargo traffic handled during April-June, 2023-24

• Amongst the Non-Major Ports, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum Overseas Cargo of 94.57 million tonnes with a share of 67.0% followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (16.0%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (8.3%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (4.9%), Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (1.9%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (1.7%) and Others (0.2%) which includes cargo handled by Non-Major Ports of A&N Island, GOA, Kerala and Karnataka during April-June, 2023-24 (Graph 2).

• Amongst the Non-Major Ports, Maharashtra Maritime Board handled the maximum Coastal Cargo of 12.94 million tonnes with a share of 37.1% followed by Gujarat Maritime Board (32.2%), Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (25.9%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (3.0%), A&N Islands (1.2%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (0.2%), and Others (0.3%) which includes cargo handled by Non-Major Ports of Puducherry, GOA, Kerala and Karnataka during April-June, 2023-24 (**Graph 3**).
