# CARGO HANDLED AT STATE MARITIME/ STATE DIRECTORATE (Non-Major Ports) DURING AND UP TO OCTOBER, 2021

### Total Cargo traffic at India's State Maritime/ State Directorate

Maritime transport activity is driven by developments in world economy, viz, growth in world output and trade. Thus, volume of seaborne cargo traffic handled by ports is mainly shaped by the levels and changes in both the global and domestic activity. Cargo traffic at Non-Major Ports during **April-October**, **2021-22**, **increased by 11.0% to 343.84 million tonnes** from 309.90 million tonnes handled during April-October, 2020-21.

The overseas cargo traffic handled at Non-Major Ports during April-October, 2021-22 increased by 8.8% to 295.99 million tonnes from 272.15 million tonnes during April-October, 2020-21. The coastal cargo traffic handled at Non-Major Ports during April-October, 2021-22 increased by 26.8% to 47.85 million tonnes from 37.75 million tonnes handled during April-October, 2020-21.


# Port-wise Cargo traffic handled during October, 2021

- Cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during October, 2021 is 48.75 million tonnes showing a decrease in growth of 8.0% as compared to the corresponding period of the previous year. The coastal cargo traffic handled at Non-Major Ports during October, 2021 increased by 24.0% to 7.10 million tonnes from 5.73 million tonnes during October, 2020. The overseas cargo handled at Non-Major Ports during October, 2021 decreased by 11.9% to 41.65 million tonnes from 47.26 million tonnes during October, 2020.
- During October, 2021, the Non-Major Ports of Kerala Maritime Board (KMB) recorded highest growth in traffic of 279.2% as compared to the corresponding period of the previous year, followed by the Non-Major Ports of Captain of Ports, Goa (133.3%), Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (109.0%), and Maharashtra Maritime Board (MMB) (13.9%). The State Maritime/ State Directorate which recorded negative growth in October, 2021 are Directorate of Ports, Pudducherry (42.2%) followed by Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (TNMB) (30.1%), Ports Management Board, A&N (27.7%), Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (GMB) (4.8%).
- During October, 2021, amongst the State Maritime/ State Directorate, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum cargo traffic at 34.46 million tonnes with a share of (70.7%) in the total cargo handled at State Maritime/State Directorate followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (12.1%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (7.8%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (7.1%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (1.3%), Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (0.7%), Ports Management Board, A&N Islands (0.2%) and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka & Kerala Maritime Board (0.1%) each.

- At a broad commodity level, Project Cargo achieved highest growth of 1191.5% in October, 2021 as compared to the corresponding period of the previous year followed by Food-grains excluding Pulses (147.8%), Iron and Steel (94.9%), POL Products (15.1%), Coking Coal (13.2%), POL Crude (9.7%), Containers (1.7%) and FRM Liquid (1.6%). FRM Dry recorded highest negative growth of 100.0% in October, 2021 followed by Sugar (73.7%), Other Ores (70.7), Thermal Coal (70.6%), Fertilizer (55.9%), Edible Oil (40.3%), LPG or LNG (22.1%) Building Material (19.1%), Cement (13.0%), Other Coal (9.2%), Iron Ore Fine/ Pellets (8.3%) and Other Commodities (3.7%).
- At a broad commodity level, Container handled the maximum cargo traffic of 9.75 Million tonnes with share of 20.0% in October 2021 followed by POL Crude (17.2%), Other Coal (13.9%), POL Products (12.1%), Other Commodities (9.7%), Coking coal (6.7%), Iron ore Pellets/ Fine (5.3%), LPG or LNG (4.4%), Thermal Coal (2.7%), Fertilizer & Cement (1.9%), Iron & Steel (1.8%), Food-grains excluding Pulses (1.0%), Other Ores (0.5%), Edible Oil (0.4%), FRM Liquid (0.3%), Building Material (0.2%), Pulses and Sugar (0.1%) each.

## Cargo traffic handled during April-October, 2021-22

During the April-October, 2021-22, Kerala Maritime Board recorded highest growth in traffic at 181.0% although there is a negligible share in total cargo handled by non-major ports of State Maritime/ State Directorate of 343.84 million tonnes followed by Captain of Ports, Goa (151.5%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (45.5%), Gujarat Maritime Board (11.7%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (7.4%) and Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (5.7%). State Maritime/ State Directorate that recorded negative growth in traffic during April-October, 2021-22 was Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (42.7%) followed by Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (13.0%), Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (12.0%) and Ports Management Board, A&N (7.2%) over April-October, 2020-21 (Table-1).



Amongst the State Maritime/ State Directorate, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum Cargo of 232.42 million tonnes with a share of 67.6% followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (15.3%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (7.4%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (7.3%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (1.2%), Directorate of Ports, Puducherry (0.8%), A&N Islands (0.2%) and Directorate of Ports Karnataka (0.1%) during April-October, 2021-22 (Graph 1 above).

- During the April-October, 2021-22, Project Cargo Record highest growth of 146.8% followed by Foodgrains excluding Pulses (81.2%), Cement (29.3%), Coking Coal (29.2%), Other Coal (26.0%), Containers (22.8%), Building Material (17.3%), Iron and Steel (17.2%), POL Crude (12.7%), Iron Ore (9.6%), Other Commodities (7.3%) and POL Products (6.8%). Other Ores recorded highest negative growth of 33.0% in traffic during April-October, 2021-22 followed by Fertilizer (28.6%), Thermal Coal (19.6%), FRM Liquid (14.9%), Edible Oil (10.4%), LPG or LNG (9.8%), Sugar (9.1%) and Pulses (7.6%) over April-October, 2020-21 (Table 2).
- Amongst all commodities, Container is the highest commodity handled at ports of 65.97 million tonnes with a share of 19.2% followed by POL Crude (15.1%), Other Coal (13.8%), POL Products (11.7%), Other commodities (10.6%), Iron Ore/ Pellets (7.0%), Coking Coal (6.2%), Thermal Coal (5.0%), LPG & LNG (3.9%), Fertilizer (2.0%), Cement (1.7%), Iron & Steel (1.4%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (0.8%), Edible Oil (0.5%), Sugar (0.4%), Other Ores (0.3%) and Building Material & FRM Liquid (0.2%) each during April-October, 2021-22.





# **Overseas and Coastal Cargo traffic handled during April-October, 2021-22**

Amongst the Non-Major Ports, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum Overseas Cargo of 207.92 million tonnes with a share of 70.2 followed by Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (15.5%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (8.0%), Maharashtra Maritime Board (3.9%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (1.3%), Puducherry (1.0%) and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (0.1%) during April-October, 2021-22 (Graph 2).



Amongst the Non-Major Ports, Gujarat Maritime Board handled the maximum Coastal Cargo of 24.50 million tonnes with a share of 51.2% followed by Maharashtra Maritime Board (28.0%), Andhra Pradesh Maritime Board (14.4%), Directorate of Ports, Odisha (3.8%), A&N Islands (1.5%), Tamil Nadu Maritime Board (0.6%), Kerala Maritime Board and Directorate of Ports, Karnataka (0.2%) each during April-October, 2021-22 (Graph 3).



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
