CARGO TRAFFIC HANDLED AT MAJOR PORTS DURING AND UP TO JANUARY, 2021

Total Cargo traffic at India's Major Ports

Maritime transport activity is driven by developments in world economy, viz, growth in world output and trade. Thus, volume of seaborne cargo traffic handled by ports is mainly shaped by the levels and changes in both the global and domestic activity. Cargo traffic at India's 12 major ports during **April-January**, **2020-21**, **decreased by 7.6% to 541.76 million tonnes** from 586.21 million tonnes cargo handled during April-January, 2019-20.

The Overseas cargo handled at Major Ports decreased by **5.6%** from 447.96 million tonnes during April-January, 2019-20 to 422.87 Million tonnes handled during April-January, 2020-21. The Coastal Cargo handled at Major port decreased by **14.0%** from 138.25 million tonnes during April-January, 2019-20 to 118.88 million tonnes handled during April-January, 2020-21.

Port-wise Cargo traffic handled during January, 2021

Cargo handled at India's major ports during January, 2021 is 64.38 million tonnes showing an increase of 4.5% as compared to the corresponding period of the previous year. The coastal cargo handled at Major Ports during January, 2021 decreased by 4.5% from 14.72 million tonnes in January, 2020 to 14.06 million tonnes during January, 2021. However, the overseas cargo handled at Major Ports increased by 7.4% to 50.32 million tonnes in January, 2021 as compared to 46.87 million tonnes during January, 2020.


- During January, 2021; Mormugao Port recorded the highest growth of traffic handled i.e. 62.6% followed SPM Kolkata Dock System (31.5%), Paradip Port (14.3%), Deendayal Port (12.2%) JNPT (9.9%), Cochin Port (8.8%), and Chennai Port (6.9%). The major ports which recorded negative growth in January, 2021 are Kamarajar Port (21.0%), Vizag Port (14.7%), VOC Port (7.2%), NMPT (5.8%), Mumbai Port (2.3%) and SPM Haldia Dock Complex by (1.8%),
- Amongst the 12 major ports, Paradip Port handled the maximum cargo traffic of 11.17 million tonnes with a share of 17.3% in the total cargo handled at Major Ports followed by Deendayal Port (16.7%), JNPT (10.1%), Vizag Port (9.5%), Mumbai Port (7.8%), SPM Haldia Dock Complex (7.1%), Chennai Port (6.6%), Cochin Port (5.1%), NMPT (4.8%), VOC Port (4.4%), Mormugao Port (4.1%), Kamarajar Port (3.8%) and SPM Kolkata Dock System (2.6%).
- At a broad commodity level, Foodgrains excluding Pulses achieved highest growth of 740.9% in January, 2021 followed by Pulses (134.1%), Coking Coal (32.2%), LPG or

LNG (23.4%), FRM-Dry (13.8%). Iron-ore (12.3%), Fertilizer (11.4%), POL Crude (11.3%), FRM Liquid (11.0%), Cement (7.9%), Containers (6.5%), Edible Oil (6.2%), Other Commodities (5.8%) and Other Coal (2.7%). Project Cargo recorded highest negative growth of 65.5% in January, 2021 followed by Sugar (58.1%), Other Ores (18.5%), POL Products (18.0%), Iron and Steel (17.6%) and Thermal Coal (14.0%).

At a broad commodity level, POL-Crude handled the maximum cargo traffic of 14.22 Million tonnes in January, 2021 with a share of 22.1% followed by Containers (21.4%), Iron ore (9.8%), Thermal Coal (9.6%), Other commodities(8.4%), POL Products (7.5%), Coking coal (6.1%), Other coal (5.0%), LPG/LNG (2.0%), Fertilizer (1.5%), Edible Oil (1.4%), FRM Dry (1.3%), FRM-Liquid (0.9%) and Iron & Steel (0.9%) each, Other Ores, Foodgrains excluding Pulses, Cement (0.6%) each and Sugar, Project Cargo and Pulses (0.1%) each.

Cargo traffic handled during April-January, 2020-21

- During April-January, 2020-21, Mormugao Port recorded highest growth of 28.2% in traffic handled at Major Ports followed by Paradip Port (0.2%). Major ports that recorded negative growth in traffic during April-January, 2020-21 were: Kamarajar Port (25.9%), SPM Kolkata Dock System (18.5%), Mumbai Port (16.1%), Chennai Port (12.7%), Cochin Port (11.9%), VOC Port (11.7%), JNPT (9.8%), NMPT (7.5%), Deendayal Port (6.7%), Vizag Port (4.4%) and SPM Haldia Dock Complex (3.2%) over April-January, 2019-20 (Table A).
- Amongst the Major Ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum Cargo of 95.09 million tonnes with a share of 17.6% followed by Paradip Port (17.3%), Vizag Port (10.7%), JNPT (9.5%), Mumbai Port (7.9%), SPM Haldia Dock Complex (6.9%), Chennai Port (6.4%), NMPT (5.3%), VOC Port (4.9%), Cochin Port (4.6%), Kamarajar Port (3.6%), Mormugao Port (3.2%), and SPM Kolkata Dock System (2.2%) during April-January, 2020-21 (Graph-I below).

• At a broad commodity level, Foodgrain excluding Pulses recorded the highest growth in traffic during April-January, 2020-21 at 58.4% followed by Sugar (57.0%), Iron Ore

(26.1%), Pulses (20.6%), FRM-Dry (13.9%), Other Ores and LPG/LNG (10.9%) each, Iron & Steel (10.4%), Fertilizer (6.0%) and FRM-Liquid (3.2%). Project cargo recorded the highest negative growth of 42.8% followed by Cement (23.4%), POL-Products (22.8%), Thermal Coal (15.5%), Edible Oil (13.6%), Other Commodities (12.7%), POL-Crude(11.5%), Coking Coal and Other Coal (10.6%) each and Container (7.2%) over April-January, 2019-20 (**Table B**).


Amongst all the commodities, Container handled the maximum cargo of 114.23 million tonnes with a share of 21.1% followed by POL-Crude (20.5%), Iron ore (10.6%), Thermal coal (10.4%), Others commodities (8.8%), POL Products (8.1%), Coking coal (5.5%), Other coal (3.6%), LPG/LNG (2.2%), Fertilizer (1.7%), Iron & Steel and Edible oil (1.6%) each, FRM Dry (1.2%), FRM liquid (1.0%), Other Ore (0.8%), Sugar (0.6%), Cement (0.5%), Foodgrains excluding Pulses (0.2%) and Project Cargo (0.1%) during April-January, 2020-21.

Overseas and Coastal Cargo traffic handled during April-January, 2020-21

Amongst the Major Ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum Overseas Cargo of 82.94 million tonnes with a share of 19.6% followed by Paradip Port (16.4%), JNPT (11.2%), Vizag Port (10.5%), SPM Haldia Dock (7.5%), Chennai Port (7.2%), Mumbai Port (5.6%), NMPT (4.9%), VOC Port (4.2%), Mormugao Port (3.8%), Cochin Port (3.7%), SPM Kolkata Dock (2.7%) and Kamarajar Port (2.6%) during April-January, 2020-21 (Graph II).



Amongst the Major Ports, Paradip Port handled the maximum Coastal Cargo of 24.14 million tonnes with a share of 20.3% followed by Mumbai Port (16.3%), Vizag Port (11.5%), Deendayal Port (10.2%), VOC Port (7.4%), Cochin Port (7.5%), Kamarajar Port (7.3%), NMPT (7.0%), SPM Haldia Dock (4.4%), Chennai Port (3.8%), JNPT (3.2%), Mormugao Port (0.9%) and SPM Kolkata Dock (0.3%) during April-January, 2020-21 (Graph III).
