CARGO HANDLED AT MAJOR PORTS DURING AND UP TO MARCH, 2020

Total Cargo traffic at India's Major Ports

Maritime transport activity is driven by developments in world economy, viz, growth in world output and trade. Thus, volume of seaborne cargo traffic handled by ports is mainly shaped by the levels and changes in both the global and domestic activity. Cargo traffic at India's 12 major ports during **April-March**, 2019-20, increased by 0.9% to 704.73 million tonnes from 698.35 million tonnes cargo handled during April-March, 2018-19.

The overseas cargo handled at Major Ports increased by **2.6%** from 524.23 million tonnes during April-March, 2018-19 to 537.87 million tonnes handled during April-March, 2019-20. However, the Coastal Cargo handled at Major port decreased by **4.2%** from 174.12 million tonnes during April-March, 2018-19 to 166.86 million tonnes handled during April-March, 2019-20.

Port-wise Cargo traffic handled during March, 2020


- Cargo handled at India's major ports during March, 2020 is 61.12 million tonnes showing decrease of 6.3% in the corresponding period of the previous year. The coastal cargo handled at Major Ports during March, 2020 decreased by 19.5% from 17.01 million tonnes in March, 2019 to 13.69 million tonnes during March, 2020. However, the overseas cargo handled at Major Ports decreased by 1.6% to 47.43 million tonnes in March, 2020 as compared to 48.22 million tonnes during March, 2019.
- During March, 2020; Cochin Port recorded the highest growth of traffic handled i.e. 8.2% followed by New Mangalore Port (5.7%) and Chidambararnar Port (4.8%). The major ports which recorded negative growth in March, 2020 are Mumbai Port (23%), Chennai Port (20.8%), Kolkata Dock (18.7%), Kamarajar Port (10.3%), JNPT (9.2%), Mormugao Port (8.6%), Haldia Dock (8.0%), Paradip Port (4.6%), Visakhapatnam Port (2.0%) and Deendayal Port (1.6%).
- Amongst the 12 major ports, **Deendayal Port handled the maximum cargo traffic of**11.1 million tonnes with a share of 18.2% in the total cargo handled at Major Ports followed by Paradip Port (16.5%), Vishakhapatnam Port (9.8%), JNPT (9.7%), Mumbai Port (7.1%), New Mangalore Port (7.0%), Haldia Dock Complex (6.7%), Chennai Port (5.9%), Chidambaranar Port (5.3%), Cochin Port (5.2%), Kamarajar Port (4.5%), Kolkata Dock System (2.2%) and Mormugao Port (2.1%).
- At a broad commodity level, **Pulses achieved highest growth of 338.8%** in March, 2020 followed by Sugar (188.9%), Cement (24.5%), Coking Coal (23.7%), LPG/LNG (22.6%),

Iron-ore (8.7%), Thermal Coal (7.6%) and Other ores (2.5%). **Project Cargo recorded highest negative growth of 75.5% in March, 2020** followed Fertilizers (62.7%), FRM-Dry (49.3%), Iron and Steel (39.9%), Edible oil (30.7%), FRM-Liquid (29.4%), Other Coal (24.3%), Food Grain excluding Pulses (21.2%), Other Commodities (18.5%), POL-Products (11.5%), Containers (10.5%) and POL-Crude (3.6%).

• At a broad commodity level, POL-Product handled the maximum cargo traffic of 13.5 Million tonnes in March, 2020 with a share of 22.1% followed by Container (19.6%), Thermal Coal (15.6%), POL Products (8.9%), Other commodities (8.6%), Iron ore (8.2%), Coking coal (5.6%), Other coal (3.3%), LPG/LNG (1.9%), Edible Oil (1.4%), Iron & Steel (0.9%), FRM-Liquid (0.8%), Cement (0.7%), FRM Dry and Other Ores (0.6%) each, Fertilizer and Sugar (0.4%) each, Food grains excluding Pulses (0.2%) and Project Cargo (0.1%).

Cargo traffic handled during April-March, 2019-20

- During April-March, 2019-20, Vishakhapatnam Port recorded highest growth in traffic handled at 11.4% followed by Cochin Port (6.3%), Deendayal Port (6.2%), V.O.C Port (5.0%), Haldia Dock (3.3%), Paradip Port (3.2%) and Mumbai Port (0.2%). Major ports that recorded negative growth in traffic during April-March, 2019-20 were: Chennai Port (11.8%) followed by Mormugao Port (9.7%), Kamarajar Port (8.0%), New Mangalore Port (7.9%), JNPT (3.2%), and Kolkata Dock (3.1%) over April-March, 2018-19 (**Table A**).
- Amongst the Major Ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum Cargo of 122.50 million tonnes with a share of 17.4% followed by Paradip Port (16.0%), Vishakhapatnam Port (10.3%), JNPT (9.7%), Mumbai Port (8.6%), Chennai Port and Haldia Dock Complex (6.6%) each, New Mangalore Port (5.6%), Chidambaranar Port (5.1%), Cochin Port (4.8%), Kamarajar Port (4.5%), Kolkata Dock System (2.5%) and Mormugao Port (2.3%) during April-March, 2019-20 (Graph- I below).

- At a broad commodity level, **Sugar** recorded the **highest growth in traffic at 58.1%** followed by Project Cargo (54.2%), Iron ore (34.6%), LPG/LNG (21.5%), Food Grain excluding pulses (17.1%), Fertilizer (12.6%), Coking Coal (7.0%), POL-Product (6.8%), FRM-Liquid (6.4%), other coal (2.6%), Cement (1.1%) and Container (1.0%). Pulses recorded the highest negative growth of 52.0% followed by Thermal Coal (14.6%), Other Ores (6.1%), FRM Dry (5.2%), Edible Oil (4.9%), Iron & Steel (4.1%), POL-Crude (3.0%) and Other Commodities (2.1%) over April-March, 2018-19 (**Table B**).
- Amongst all the commodities, POL-Crude handled the maximum cargo of 151.80 million tonnes with a share of 21.5% followed by Container (20.8%), Thermal coal (11.8%), POL Products (9.6%), Others commodities (9.1%), Iron ore (7.9%), Coking coal (5.7%), Other coal (3.7%), LPG/LNG (1.9%), Edible oil (1.6%), Fertilizer (1.3%) and Iron & Steel (1.3%) each, FRM Dry and FRM liquid (0.9%) each, Other ores and Cement (0.6%) each, Sugar (0.4%) and Project Cargo and Food-grains excluding Pulses (0.1%) each during April-March, 2019-20.





Overseas and Coastal Cargo traffic handled during April-March, 2019-20

Amongst the Major Ports, Deendayal Port handled the maximum Overseas Cargo of 105.7 million tonnes with a share of 19.7% followed by Paradip Port (14.4%), JNPT (11.9%), Vishakhapatnam Port (10.4%), Chennai Port (7.8%), Mumbai Port (6.4%), Haldia Dock (6.0%), New Mangalore Port (5.4%), Chidambaranar Port (5.1%), Cochin Port (4.3%), Kamarajar Port (3.3%) and Kolkata Dock & Mormugao Port (2.7%) each during April-March, 2019-20 (Graph II).



• Amongst the Major Ports, Paradip Port handled the maximum Coastal Cargo of 35.35 million tonnes with a share of 21.2% followed by Mumbai Port (15.8%), Deendayal Port (10.0%) Vishakhapatnam Port (10.0%), Haldia Dock (8.8%), Kamarajar Port (8.2%), Cochin Port (6.6%), New Mangalore Port (6.0%), Chidambaranar Port (5.3%), Chennai Port (3.0%), JNPT (2.5%), Kolkata Dock (1.7%) and Mormugao Port (0.9%) during April-March, 2019-20 (Graph III).
